When He says to your soul, "Go On"

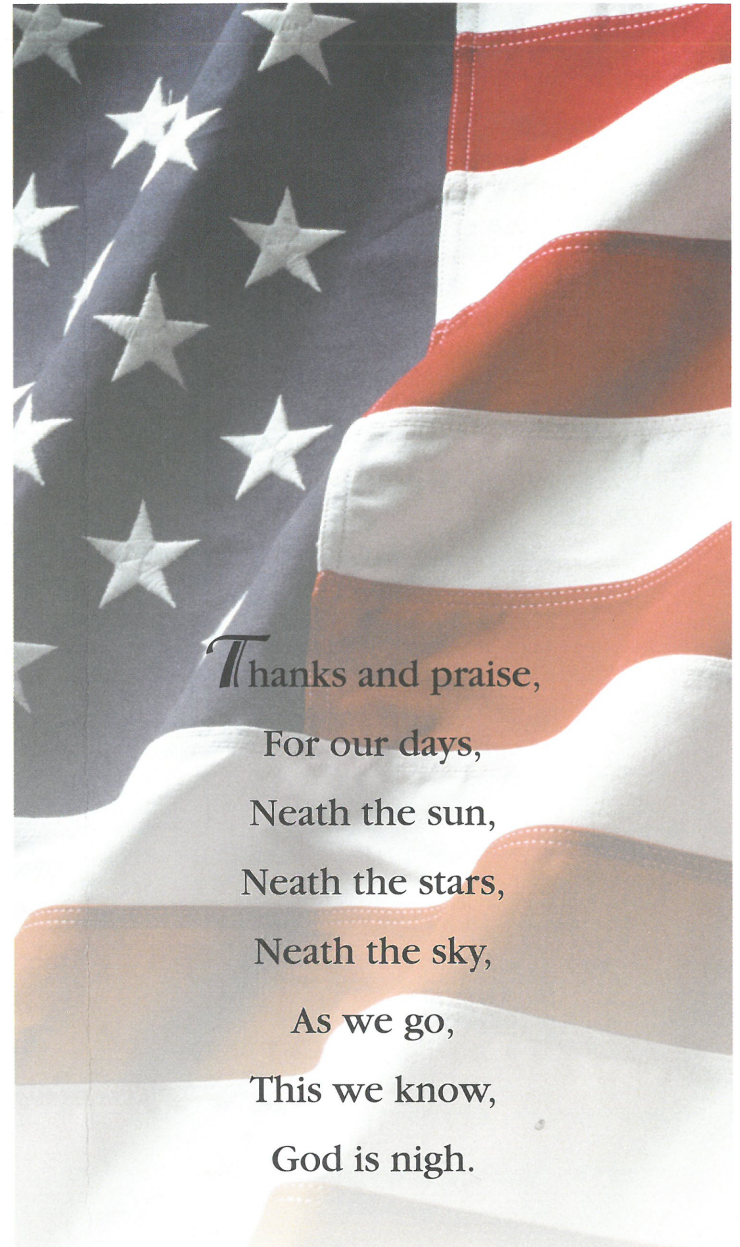

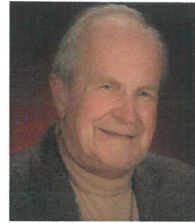

Clarence (Chuck) James Schaub was born in Lackawanna, New York on May 10, 1935 to Howard and Ethel Schaub. At a young age his mother and the children moved to Charleston, WV to live with his grandfather, David Clyde Turk. He attended St. Anthony’s Catholic School through the eight grade. Chuck’s high school years were spent at a Catholic farm/school, Don Bosco’s near Elkins, WV. This school, run by Salesian monks, was a working farm. The students farmed half days and took classes half days six days a week.

After high school, Chuck joined the Air Force and took training as a hydraulics mechanic. He was stationed at Davis Monthan Air Force Base in Tucson, during the Korean conflict. The crew flew worldwide to repair planes. After the service he settled in California for over thirty years.

Chuck was preceded in death by his parents, Howard and Ethel Schaub; his first wife, Alexandra MacDonald; sisters Evie Hart of NY, Margie Cooper of MD. and granddaughter, Nicole Niemietz. Survivors include his wife Sue Lynn Henn Schaub of Clarinda, Iowa, daughter Carole (Bruce) Niemietz of Marion, Indiana; stepdaughter, Lynn Theobald of Omaha, Nebraska; stepson Lance Henn of Tacoma, Washington; and two granddaughters, Carole and Cassandra Niemietz; other relatives and friends.
