Marlin Edwin Holmes was born the second of three children to Elmer Edwin and Inez Catherine (Falk) on September 25, 1925 at their home in rural Essex, Iowa. On Wednesday, October 10, 2013, at age 88, Marlin entered into rest at his home in Shenandoah, Iowa.


Marlin grew up on a farm outside of Essex where he attended Arbordale Country School, fondly named "Frog Pond." He graduated from Shenandoah High School in 1943, and in April of the same year was drafted into the U.S. Army. While in the army, he served as a Supply Sergeant in Osaka, Japan during the occupation until being honorably discharged in December of 1946.

He completed his final project in 1998.

Marlin was preceded in death by his parents; his sister, Elmarie (Holmes) Irvin and her husband Dale Richard Irvin.

Left to cherish his memory is his wife Jacqualine; daughter Marlene (Holmes) Bashaw and son-in-law Joel of Shenandoah; brother Allen Holmes and wife Clara of Shenandoah; granddaughters Elizabeth Bashaw of Omaha, Nebraska and Heidi (Bashaw) Eide and husband Eric of Alexandria, Virginia; grandson Todd Bashaw of Shenandoah; and great-grandson Grayson Eide of Alexandria, Virginia; and many other relatives and friends.
